UK Budget: The storm clouds have lifted



Overall, the Budget was positive for the bond markets and that can't be underestimated. We should now have a much clearer path for rate cuts in mind and in time that should deliver a better outlook for UK economic growth, albeit this will take time to come through.

Lower bond yields and lower interest rates are supportive for the interest rate-sensitive sectors of the market, particularly for mid-caps and more domestically focused companies. The Fund should be well placed to benefit here with around 50 % of our exposure to the SMID-cap area and 66 % of the Fund being exposed to domestic earners.

The key rate-sensitive sectors we would highlight would include the REITs, house builders, areas of UK consumer spending, food producers and some diversified financials.

Lower bond yields have a direct positive impact on the valuation of REITS. Falling yields support higher NAVs. If we look at the fundamentals, especially in prime central London, they remain extremely strong. We've seen demand exceed supply and rental growth remaining robust. As lingering concerns on the bond market start to ease, these strong fundamentals should become more visible. The Fund holds companies such as Great Portland Estates and Shaftesbury, both businesses exposed to prime central London and trading at discounts of over 30 % to their book value.

Georgina Hamilton: Housebuilders are another area where lower bond yields feed through quickly. While the sector did not receive any direct policy support such as help to buy or stamp duty cuts, lower mortgage rates provide a meaningful tailwind. Those companies trading below book value should, in our view, recover to at least book value given the resilience of their asset bases. The fund owns Bellway, which is currently trading at a decent discount to book.

Lower mortgage and savings rates should also bolster UK consumer spending. Beneficiaries include supermarkets such as Marks & Spencer's and Sainsbury's as well as food producers like Premier Foods and Cranswick.

Banks, meanwhile, avoided additional taxes that have been widely anticipated. Underlying trading remains strong and we expect further upgrades from the domestic banking sector in 2026. The Fund is overweight this area.

While gambling taxes have increased, the changes exclude spread-betting and are more favourable for land-based operators.

As the storm clouds of the Budget finally recede and we look towards 2026, the UK will likely find itself in the top half of the G7 for GDP growth. We believe it will also have positive real incomes and the refinancing headwind for mortgages, which has so plagued the UK consumer for the past few years, will finally burn out over the course of the year, enabling real income growth to actually be diverted into real spending growth.

This should provide a good backdrop for UK domestics, midcaps and rate sensitive stocks in 2026.
